## News from Managing Librarian Richard Suico

Like for many of us during the holiday season, it is a festive and hectic time of year at the library, too. How and what we do is as nuanced and varied as the people the library serves.

If I were to broadly categorize how I will spend this time, it will be on reflection, connection and anticipation. It is with those concepts I would like to highlight some library happenings and resources.

Upon reflection, what really stood out this year were programs and events. They were well attended, mirrored the community's needs and attendees recognized themselves as part of the library community. From children story times to tween and teen makerspace labs to author talks as well as grassroots initiated classes courtesy of the EPIC writers group or the ESL volunteers, programs were popular and engaging.

Many of them were supported with money raised by your volunteer time and effort. It is difficult to choose just one to highlight, but I did want to single out the monthly Music at the Library series, which is held the third Thursday each month on the same evening as Art Walk Edmonds.

It is a great example of collaboration with Edmonds Arts Commission, Art Walk Edmonds, the Friends and the Library. Plus, it is a venue to exhibit some of the talented

In November, in addition to hosting over 70 people for the Hot Club of Troy's jazz music, the Friends sponsored the "Libraries Inspire Creativity" event. It drew artists of all ages with library inspired projects. There were four raffle drawing winners who received a new Kindle tablet and a free "book a librarian" session to setup the device.

The idea of connection is a vital part of what the library does every day in numerous ways. It can be the daily interaction with staff when you check out a book at circulation or when a librarian helps you with finding your next best read or helps you download an e-book. It can also be at home as you search the catalog for a book or use one of the databases.

Did you know that we have a new search tool that accesses many of the library's databases in one fast, single search experience? It is called EDS (Ebsco Discovery Service) and available on the research resources page at the sno-isle.org website tab labelled "Research."

It answers the initial research question: Where do I begin my research on a topic? (Suico, page 5)

It is intuitive and as familiar as using a commercial search engine with results that have been evaluated for accuracy, currency and credibility.

Ask at the info desk for a demo or help.

In terms of anticipation, I look forward to implementing Sno-Isle Libraries strategic priorities in early 2017. It will provide the library with guidance and direction for the next 3 years. The Library Board has already approved values and purposes earlier this year based on the beliefs that:

- Each individual's right to free and equal access to information and ideas.
- The worth and appreciation of diverse points of view
- The value of individuals, community and culture
- The importance of innovation in meeting evolving customer needs and expectations
- Accountability for the public's resources.

And our organization will promote a literate and informed citizenry by:

- Offering equal access to the library and its resources for all
- Championing early literacy
- Supporting lifelong learning
- Providing space to think, meet, work, and create
- Convening people for public discourse.

By sharing these values and purposes, I hope it helps you understand what will drive our actions in the coming years. In practical terms, you can continue to rely on the library to be an authoritative source for your information and research needs; and a place to obtain advice on your next great read or help with your device or technology question.

We will be a place where you'll feel part of a community of shared interests while attending a program or event and find opportunities to meet and socialize with others in the community. Hope you had a great holiday season, and I'll see you in the library in 2017!
